Flower Guild information for Spring

Easter Flowers

We will be decorating the Church for Easter on Good Friday this year after 4pm or on the Saturday morning from 10am. Please let us know if you would like to do a placement.

There will be lilies available to dedicate to loved ones in each Easter arrangement. They are £3.50 per lily. Please fill in the form in the porch and return it to Sue Thomas or Trudy Harris by Wednesday 27th March with the payment.

Church Rota

Anyone is welcome to do the Church flowers seen in the church every week. The Rota is in the Church Porch and you sign up to cover 2 Sundays. The flowers can be an arrangement or just a vase of your favorites and will be left for the 2 weeks (you just need to check and water them). There is a £20 allowance for anyone to claim for the flowers and you can pick a time that means something to you or just whenever the feeling takes you! They need to be in the church for the Sunday service. Anyone is welcome and you just sign your name on the rota. The next gap to cover is the 2 weeks starting with the 14th April (covering the 14th and 21st). Please don't be shy everyone is welcome.

Kingston Seymour Parish Council

Our meeting on the 13th March was dominated by discussion of the forthcoming Pier to Pier Way and the so called "Duck Lane Link". We were joined by the new NSC

Project Manager for both sessions.

Pier to Pier Multi-User Way

We were told that the end was in sight with the essential farm track nearing completion which would allow completion of the surfacing to the multi-user way and for the fencing to be finished. You will have seen the posts for the route signage go up and we understand that the new, high up, signs will be attached and not covered, with a lower-level temporary sign saying that the route is not yet open in place (more easily removed by contractors when it does open!)

Councillors learned that the plans agreed last year with the residents of Yeo Bank Lane for passing places along this stretch were not yet in place, but we were assured that budget would be found and that these would be installed. They would only be "deep" enough for vehicles to pass and clearly marked as such. They are not to be treated as parking places, there will be no double yellow lines as this is not appropriate in a rural situation.

Councillors were very concerned that specific points raised in the safety audit, such as the access of HGVs through Lower Strode Road, the dangerous corner and parking at Dowlais Farm corner were all risks that NSC officers have decided are "acceptable" and nothing further is going to be done to mitigate these risks regardless of our concerns.

Our Police team have said that they will increase patrols when the route opens to try and ensure that cyclists and other users of the route behave responsibly. There still seems much to do but opening "in the spring" remains the declared intent and perhaps by the time of the next edition of this magazine, a formal date will have been declared!

Duck Lane Link

Councillors were informed that the physical construction works needed are expected to be completed within three months. Councillors remain concerned that with there being no real prospect of the link carrying on to Clevedon in the short or medium term and with the Road Safety Audit

strongly suggesting that Lampley Road is not suitable for family cyclists. Councillors raised concerns that public money is not being spent well, offering little gain for Strawberry Line users but an increased danger should they unwittingly enter the Lampley Road having come from the relatively safe "off road" section.

We will continue to press on both matters.

Other Business

Councillors discussed a planning application in the village and learned from our police team that thieves were targeting vans in Yatton – particularly those with sliding doors and where the lock is being drilled out to gain access. Rogue traders have also been operating in the area and parishioners are reminded that if someone offers to take away your rubbish, they must have a Waste Carriers licence from NSC. If they don't and your rubbish is fly tipped somewhere but can be traced back to you, you will be prosecuted.

About village maintenance, we have agreed to the annual cuts that have been undertaken annually in certain parts of the village and we have accepted a quotation to prune the trees on the Triangle and remove a dying maple tree. This will give more space for a small Christmas tree to be planted there for festive decoration when the time comes later this year.

I'd like to say a big "Thank You" to everyone who plays a part in looking after our village.

I saw Mr and Mrs Calderbank picking up litter from the Lampley Road verges the other day and I know that they walk miles around our lanes doing so. I'd also like to thank Judith Barber who has the unpleasant task of emptying the three public waste bins in the village. I know she needs a strong stomach for this but I'm pretty sure that she'd rather have dog poo bags placed in these bins than for the poo to be left at the side of the road or hanging up in a hedge. Please, if you are a dog owner, pick up after your beloved canine and either take the poo home to your own bin or place it in one of the three in the village. Thank you.

Finances

Financially, the parish accounts remain sound and, after meeting all our budget plans including issuing grants and funding the church corner

railings project, we should end the financial year in March 2024 with some £10k in the bank. You may have noticed the small increase in Parish precept that I told you about last time now appearing amongst all the other increases on your Council Tax Bills!

And finally

NSC have recently issued two consultations. The first is about parking in Clevedon, Portishead and Nailsea with the possibility of charging. I'm pretty sure that this will affect many of you so please have your say on the proposals.

The second is about the possibility of switching to a three weekly waste (black bin) collection cycle.

I'll put some details of both on our village website, and they can also be accessed via the NSC site. Please do have your say!

Our next meeting is on the 8th May in the Village Hall and the first part will be the annual meeting of the Parish Council where we will deal with all the regulatory things we need to do. Then we will have a standard meeting to discuss progress on all the outstanding issues. All are welcome to attend.

On **Wednesday 22nd May** we will be holding the Annual Village Meetings night when we will review what your Parish Council has done and will also hold the annual meetings of the Friends and of the Village Hall itself. Please make a note in your diaries to come along and support your parish organisations.

New initiative helps N.Somerset community groups provide local people with expert energy advice.

Calling all community groups in North Somerset! A new project run by the <u>Centre for Sustainable Energy</u> (CSE) is offering community groups funding and support to promote retrofit among local homeowners.

Retrofit means any work to improve the energy efficiency of a home. From insulation to low-carbon technologies like solar panels, retrofit describes any changes made to a home to make it cheaper to heat and more environmentally friendly. Household energy use makes up about 15% of the UK's carbon emissions, so retrofitting homes is vital in our journey to net zero.

CSE is looking for local community groups to help host Open Homes events. They will provide advice and support throughout the project, as well as tailored resources and grants of up to £5k. Classical Concert for Hope

On Friday 15th March All Saints church was honoured to host a candle light, fantastic classical concert in aid of the Hope Christian Trust.

The concert was the inspiration of Beth Burdge from Mendip View Farm. Beth is a singing Purcell scholar at the Wells Cathedral School. Beth and her friend Emily organised the concert with several vocalists from the school. We were entertained to solos, duets and chamber arrangements. The program was diverse with sacred music, opera and even a rendition of an English folk song.

The atmosphere was truly magical and we became very emotional by the end of their concert. We thoroughly enjoyed their encore.

The ladies of Kingston again produced a fantastic selection of canapés during the interval, which were much appreciated by all along with the selection of wines.

The Reverend John Angle gave a short but succinct talk about the Hope Christian Trust, which he and his wife Janet have been trustees for 20 years. This trust supports a Christian School in Gaza City. Many of the audience were unaware that there are Christians there, 800 in total. The Lighthouse School has both Christian and Muslim teachers and pupils. There are about 280 pupils educated there. "Google" the school to learn more about this wonderful institution. Janet also created a display of her beautiful, embroidered Palestinian dresses, including a wedding dress, which she has collected over many years.

As a result of this concert we were able to raise over £1,800 and donations are still being received. These funds are needed urgently as John has recently sent about £8,000 to buy food for the Christian's who are sheltering in the Catholic and Orthodox Church compounds surviving on any food they can find at extortionate cost. Funds will also be desperately needed to help restart the school when this war ends, hopefully in the near future.

Many thanks to all our friends near and wide, who supported the concert on Friday and also those generous people who have sent donations. Any further donations can be given to Sue Lang or Sue Thomas, who will forward them to John. It is also possible to make regular donations to the trust.

Church Notes

Fran's farewell was on 11th February. It was lovely to have her with us for Burns Night, and to join with her and Bishop Mike the week before, for a Confirmation Service here at All

Saints, the first for a number of years. An adult declaration of faith is always very meaningful and was a very fitting end to Fran's ministry in post, before retirement. The following week we joined with Kenn where she was presented with a welcome cheque from all of us. Kingfisher Cottage is owned by the Diocese and is to be let for the time being.

Whatever our crazy world throws at us, nature can always show that there is always hope. Spring brings that more than any other season and in our church we also have signs of hope. Our team of 5 churches has been without a Team Rector now for almost two years, Fran's leaving has left a vacancy with the House for Duty position and by the time this goes to print, the remaining full-time priest at Cleeve and Claverham will also have moved on.

But ... we are beginning to find ways of all working together, to share the resources we have, to discover what makes each of our churches and communities different and to get to know each other better. We are also incredibly blessed to have Avril, and two other retired priests, offering their help and support across the 5 churches, as well as lay people, offering their time and gifts where a service can be held without a priest.

So we are in good heart and doing all we can to keep All Saints a place where all are welcome and our service pattern can continue. Another great reason for hope is that the Team Rector's post has been advertised so we wait just a little longer to discover the outcome of that.

Easter Avril will lead the 2pm Hour at the Foot of the Cross service, starting by the 3 crosses that Norman and Sam put up in the churchyard

Easter Sunday: 11am All Age Holy Communion celebration for this central Christian Festival will be led by Rev John Angle

Easter Sunday and Easter Monday 2.30pm-5.00pm Cream Teas and Cake and Tea in the church and outside, with a Plant Stall and Easter Egg Hunt. Take away boxes are also available if you would prefer to eat at home and cards can be accepted!

Minor repair work has been taken to treat woodworm in the wall plate of the wagon roof. The blocked chimney flue has been cleared and the gap where the jackdaws found their way in, now secure again. The churchyard grants given by both the Parish Council and the Friends of All Saints ensure that outside maintenance can be tackled; ditch clearing, and mower servicing and repairs were the main items last year.

The silver birch had to be felled because of disease, but Angus has done a fantastic job of selling the wood to more than cover the cost of having this done. Gateposts and fencing are a must for this year, almost all need replacing. At long last we plan to make the repairs needed to the Chancel and Vestry roofs and valley. A massive thank you to Pete Briscoe and Steve for finding the reason for water coming in through the south aisle roof. A very old, hand-made nail had forced its way back up through the lead, leaving a hole large enough for the rain to get in.

A huge thank you as well, to Aaron who got hold of some tarmac and filled in the large potholes outside Church House. Margaret, I know, has had offers of help from people unable to make a churchyard working party. All these things make a massive difference, it may not seem much, but truly it is - thank you to each and every one of you...... and who does fill that planter on the fence by the Old School.

Finally, we send our love and our prayers to John and Leonie. Thank you John for all you have given us and continue to do. Bless you both.

For our final concert on **Saturday 18th May**, the YMS welcome the brilliant young flautist Stephanie Gilbert, Stephanie is currently based in Backwell and is an alumna of Millfield school and the RNCM. She will be accompanied by Bristol based Helen Reid who is a former BBC finalist Young Musician of the year.
